COURAGE COMES FROM THOSE WHO DON'T STAND STILL, INSTEAD STAND AGAINST ADVERSITY ! (from 1)

As I grew up, progressed from elementary to high school and then to college, I always had some sort of model within reach. *It had become my hobby.*

Then, after graduating from college and starting my career, I fell into a band of brigands, cutthroats, and general undesirables, known as the local IPMS chapter. These guys were great. I learned a lot from them and *not just about building models*. These folks were happy to share their collective knowledge of just about everything – history, politics, how to improve your modeling experience. I had had brief encounters with *other clubs* – model railroading, wargaming – *but there was always something that felt a little stand offish about them*. But not with the local *IPMS chapter*. *Thinking back now I believe their secret was not to take themselves too seriously*. After all, it's just a hobby, so have fun!

I learned, progressed and grew to be a better modeler. I even won a few trophies along the way.

Then came my second "career" as a modeler after 50 years of fun with the hobby.

It was 2010 and I had a stroke. Two, actually, in a year's time.

It left me with no fine motor skills in my left hand and a constant sort of deadened sensation in my right. It took me about a year before I got the desire to build anything.

A lot of it had to do with getting my head on straight. I knew that I would not be as good or prolific builder as I once was. That wasn't the problem.

I had to overcome my own self-imposed barriers. Fear was a big one – fear that I couldn't do something. Something as easy as applying decals became a challenge. I had to relearn or adapt techniques from my other hobbies

I started by painting my gaming figures.

The hardest part here was trying to find a way to hold on to the figures and maneuver them around



(remember, I don't have any fine motor skills in my left hand).

Well, I found a technique that some people use when doing 6mm figures – *the popsicle stick* !

I white glued the figure to the stick, so now I have an extra long handle to move around.

Sounds simple, but it works.

It also can be used for wheels and other sorts of things.




Like say: engine blocks, fairings, turrets, etc.



One of the biggest problems I have is realizing that I now have limitations.

This can affect everything from what subject I choose, what scale, all the way to how I plan to finish the project and display it. For example, I may now choose a simpler paint scheme on a slightly larger scale kit. Cleaning up bogies on a 35th scale JS-2 is simpler than trying to do the same thing on a 72nd scale kit. On the other hand, the 72nd JS may have 50 parts versus the 300 plus of its bigger cousin.



Which to choose?

As far as finishing the kit, there is the age old question of hand brushing versus airbrushing.

Right now, I'm not sure if I can even handle my airbrush. Only experimentation will tell. And what about decaling? I may, or may not, be able to effectively use my left hand in removing the decals from their backing. Or placing them where I want them to go.

Again, only time will tell.

This all leads up to a major point – do not be afraid to try and fail.

So what if you have to adjust your expectations down a little. The whole point of the hobby is to have fun.

Right now there is only one way to go and that is up. In truth, it may very well be like when you first started building – use snap tight kits and eventually progressing to glue kits.





Or maybe...

the whole realm of gunpla kits - snap together kits - now opens up to you. Don't be afraid to adjust and adapt.



The Editor, fond of Seattle IPMS' "NABBROKE" award, wanted us to try "Nostalgic Aging Baby Boomer Reliving Old Kit Experience"

Contest Basics: May use ANY kit molded through the year 1970. No aftermarket items that weren't available in the same time frame. "Super Glue" (cyanoacrylate), "acrylic" paints are permissible, since antecedents in that time period (first Golden Age of Modelling) <u>NO</u> use of <u>Alclad</u>, <u>Metalizer</u>, <u>Future</u>. Entries MUST be finished for Awards qualify.





While this has been tried several times before, the challenge of this concept has not diminished in spite of notorious low turnout responses. Sometimes there's a pleasing vigorous rise to meet this test, a recent Region Nine "Hobby Expo" did this whole theme proud, even providing artistically rendered "real retro" award, the competition population for it, large !

Well, Cliff Kranz provided us with new

dimension on the whole competitive population for this type of contest. That is Cliff in the cap, white logo shirt behind one of his own entries, the large yellow Tow, in picture on right of preceding page. Notice the tall figure with the pike facing the Executive Board. Cliff was responsible for his being part of our retro show contest ... by virtue of transport.





Say hello to *Mister Kranz's* Blue Knight. That's right, done by Mister Kranz

Not the Life Member you know and see at our meeting here. Modeler Mister Kranz of an Aurora Plastics 1/8 scale Blue Knight from 1958 as in Cliff's Dad.

Cliff was inspired to carefully remove this cherished family heirloom from a Display cabinet, clean up some minor amount of dust, and bring it to enter as a true "retro build". Cliff recalled he was about 9 years old when his dad hand painted, well detailed this kit. Nice surprise, thanks Cliff ! Here is Cliff's two:



No slouch in the detailing department himself, Cliff had a nearly same vintage molding as his Dad's Blue Knight with a "blue night" of his own. He made it clear that wasn't year he built it, this being the Revell "box scale" P2V-7 Patrol Bomber that came out around 1957, and was in configuration for "Operation Deep Freeze" bird "out of the box". That has some significance in what you see here, due that meant kit provided you one option, an Engine Gray and Internat'l Orange P2V late model, ski equipped landing gear and of course Arctic mission markings. What Cliff has here, made in "the good old days", is a home brewed conversion to an earlier model of P2V. Including the removal of glass turret, nose, remove the distinctive long MAD boom on fuselage tail and reshape to unarmed tail turret configuration. Also, find a proper "gloss sea blue" and convincing "matching box scale" star/bar markings. No small feat, then or now. Oh, and don't forget that he had to make sure the landing gear was restored to "land plane" detail structure.



Cliff Kranz's nickname from "way back when" days, a few of us may recall, "Trucker" is perfectly captured when he brings in one of the scale ones

This 1969 vintage molding, a Revell kit, was crafted into an entirely original rendering by Cliff when he was stationed at Fort Hood, with US Army.

As he made clear, the heavy duty tow titan here has a stock (kit) front end on it. After that everything you see that makes



up that busy rear bed is scratchbuilt by Cliff. From the "life giving" busy bit parts like the blocks, etc that are scattered about the working floor area, to a complete working boom crane, and of course, the entire rear end structure!

Thank you, Cliff. Quite a fun evening getting the story and techniques that were behind the "retro entries" for your entries alone !

Equally prolific and avid in our club in house competitions, was Laramie !





to fully "retro" the finish, as he would have built it in his youth. There was a method to this madness, which Editor was aware of, Laramie had done this bird much earlier than this contest you see.

Laramie chose a different scheme as you see here.

He said it was a pretty fun build other than fact he had to fabricate a suitable interior, having none in the original.

Discussion with the members present in his Model Talk here, clarified that this "lack" was "authentic", as Laramie's memory of this aircraft model having an interior provided was actually based on the 1/72 scale Airfix kitting, which nearly the same vintage.





I can say that with complete confidence, as I'm the sponsor of trophy. As well as the Free Hornets Contest Director of Tri City XI on 9-27-15

That will be the <u>70th</u> Anniversary of the end of World War 2, in which the First Straight Wing Jet took flight (in 1939 !) and also saw several of the same planform during its span (2nd to fly, Italy's CC.1 Caproni in '40, Whittle E28/39 was 3rd, Bell P-59A in 1942 was 4th...) which should be a good start of how one might compete for that award ! This award here, is also going to be in play in the TC-11 edition of itself, one reason I've chosen it for the "style sample" (another happens to be I don't have SWJ)

Just keep in mind, TriCity Special Awards don't "sweep", so one might be smart to choose subjects that can "cross compete" for best results. As "German/Germany" theme has been chosen for the TC-XI, perhaps one could look into American made or designed Straight Wing Jets that were employed. In such way that one could "cross compete" for "Best SWJ", "Best (German) Marine", Best "Post 1945 German", "Best German" and "Hornets Sting" for Best American Fighter aircraft, for example... ©
