Another intriguing new item for the modeler of means, from **P.A.** (aka **Postoria Aguirre**) !


I utterly appreciate the number of things that P.A. shares with us, he constantly is finding incredible new tech for model making, oh yes.



I thought his precision cutting tool that he had along with his Thunderbird 2 model recently,was something else. I find this "blue light UV" device equally engaging. It's based on well known Dentistry tech, but adapted to the modeler's needs which P.A. eloquently described at our meeting.

Just as an example: P. A. was pointing out that the current wave of 3-D printed models and parts from that same tech, often still as a result of their manufacture, have a lot of tough filling issues for the modeler. The "stepped" look, or the rough surfacing as you will. He researched and got the device you see here. Which he warned was pricey, but yes also our time is valuable too, and this is a real saver for it!

In any case, here we have some more in that vein








In a more traditional mode, a 1/24th scale race machine WIP courtesy of Mike Meek. Good to see you, Mike



This "father and son shot" won't give you any more clue, but at least dad's F4U in foreground is lot closer to what many of us think as "his genre" That is, a US Navy aircraft in 1/48. If you haven't guessed, "*Unknown Modeler*" (as I termed him in 2022 March's Model of the Month) aka better known as **Geoff Kreuger**, as he put it wryly, did show up with his grand collection of 'not what you usually think of me building". Geoff has come back sporadically since 2017, after leaving us for his volunteer military enlistment back in the 1990's. He has been quite a prolific builder. Most often showing up at our meetings or winning at contests with wide range of modern period 1/48th scale USN fighter or attack aircraft.

So, what you're seeing is somewhat not same aspect. As ever still, shows Geoff's skill as builder, researcher and pro-am public speaker very well here.

This last Mustang is post WW2, yes okay, but still is part of Geoff's fine gathering. I didn't get kit noted, but done as Paul Mantz's P-51C which first raced in 1946 Bendix. 1/1 is now restored as "*Ina The Macon Belle*"






As Kent kindly enlightened us, yes, in Japan they have actual beer vending machines, some in the shape of the can! He gave me a closeup look of his.

Below, Chris Bucholtz had some new models and writings to share with us. Page on, intrepid readers !









While his 1/72nd Macchi seems no worse for the wear, perhaps that camel dude laying down is why Chris's "George" job isn't done?










